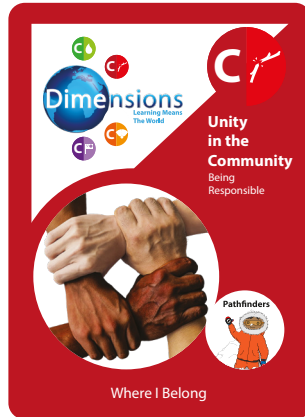

What are the special features of our school grounds and the area around our school?

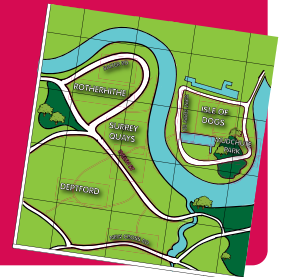

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How to...

...find out about our local environment

- We can look at maps, plans and Google Street View and talk to people who live here. We can go on walks to explore our locality and can look at photographs to see how our school and places nearby have changed.



Concept Flow

- To learn about the geography of the school and the key human and physical features of its grounds and immediately surrounding environment. Use aerial photographs and plan perspectives to recognise landmarks and basic physical features of the local area.
- To know the key human features of the local area, including appropriate vocabulary such as city, town, village, factory, farm, house, office and shop
- To know the key physical features of the local area, including appropriate vocabulary such as beach, coast, forest, hill, mountain, ocean, river, soil, valley, vegetation
- To know how to locate the school on a map
- To learn about how places have become the way they are and how they are changing
- To recognise changes in the environment and identify how the environment may be improved and sustained
- To learn about significant historical events, people and places in the locality

Vocabulary

Aerial view: a picture something from above

Beach: usually made of sand or pebbles and slopes to meet the sea

Boundary: the edge of something

City: a big town

Coast: the edge of the sea

Countryside: an area used for farming

Forest: a big area covered in trees

Human features: places and things that have been built or made by people

Landmark: something that is easy to see and can be used to find your way to a place near it

Landscape: natural scenery

Local: nearby

Locality: the area around

Map: an image of an area

Mountain: higher than a hill

Physical features: natural features

Valley: a low area of land between hills or mountains

Vegetation: plants, trees and bushes

Village: a little town
