

# Protect your phone with two factor authentication



We want everyone to keep hold of their phones and protect it from theft. Head to your **Settings** on your phone and **enable two-factor authentication**.

Two-factor authentication is designed to make sure you're the only person who can access your account.

## Secure your iPhone and your other devices



On your iPhone or iPad: Go to **Settings** > [your name] > Sign-In & Security. Tap **Turn On Two-Factor Authentication.** Then tap Continue and follow the onscreen instructions.

You can **add a trusted family member or friend** to this so they can stop thieves signing you out of your accounts if you get into trouble.



Trusted people can include your brother, sister, cousin, parents, friend, or someone who can contact you easily.

# Android phones and your other devices



To enable two-factor authentication on your Android device:

Go to **device settings**, then tap your profile image in the top right corner of the screen.

Then, click the Password and security option and tap Two-step verification. Verify the phone number you will use to receive verification codes by text message.



You can also download **Google and Microsoft authentication apps** to help protect your phone.

### Keeping you and your mates safe



- Turn on your phone location and share with someone you trust
- Add trusted adults to your emergency contacts on your phone
- Keep valuables hidden, in a zip pocket, when travelling on public transport or walking to and from school
- Put the number **81018** in your phone in case you spot antisocial behaviour or something wrong on the bus, train, or tram.



Text "SeeSay" followed by a space, then include details of the incident, such as the time, date, location, and bus service number
